Source of Obligation	The NSW Registration Manual (3.6.2) requires the School to have in place and implement policies and procedures in relation to pastoral care.
What is Pastoral Care?	Pastoral care is the support given to students for their development as a person. It relates to the total care of students and involves tending to both the academic and non-academic needs of students, including their spiritual, emotional and social wellbeing. Pastoral care recognises the overriding principle of acting in the best interests of the child.

	All School staff are responsible for pastoral care, and for administering pastoral care in all classes and extra- curricular activities.
Who is Responsible for Pastoral Care?	Additionally, we have created a Pastoral Care Team that is responsible for ensuring the proper ongoing administration of pastoral care services at the School. Our current Pastoral Care Team is: Led by the Head of School, who has formed a Child Safety and Wellbeing Team. Given the nature of our small, inclusive school and its cohort all school staff participate in the support and care of our students. The School also engages with qualified specialists as required.
